COMMUNITY ACTION PLAN UPDATE

The St Monans & Abercrombie Community Action Plan ('CAP') was created in 2018 to summarise the opinions and aspirations of our local communities.

As a reminder, the CAP was based on a series of household surveys and interviews undertaken in both villages during autumn 2018. These responses were presented at a community open day where local residents were given the opportunity to vote for their favourite projects. The whole process was coordinated by a small team of volunteers, all of whom were local residents.

A number of ideas identified by the community and included in the CAP have been successfully implemented (or are in the process of being implemented). As the CAP report expires at the end of this year, it is worth reflecting on what it has achieved; the CAP didn't make all these things happen - it simply listed our aspirations!

- improved disabled access to the Auld Kirk

- development of cycle paths between East Neuk villages
- establishment of a mother and toddler group
- establishment of a walking group and other interest groups
- renovation of outdoor swimming pool
- renovation of the play parks

STAYING SAFE ON THE FIFE COASTAL PATH

Users of the Fife coastal path may have noticed the appearance of new coastal safety markers like the one near St Monans windmill which is pictured here.


There are 38 markers between Shell Bay and Kingsbarns which are designed to help locate people requiring emergency assistance. Each has a unique reference (in this case, E-13) which is recognised by the emergency services who will not only know the precise location, but also the best access points to save potentially vital minutes in reaching those needing assistance.

The project leading to their installation has been run in partnership with RNLI Anstruther Community Safety Team, Fife Coast and Countryside Trust, Police Scotland and The Waid Academy. It will be reviewed over coming years, with the hope that the model is taken up by other coastal locations around the UK.



ANSTRUTHER LIFESAVING HUB

The RNLI is the charity that saves lives at sea in Scotland. In Anstruther, our volunteer crew cover one of the busiest waterways in the UK and we urgently need to raise £100,000 to fund new facilities so that we can continue saving lives.



Alongside the clear benefits in terms of lifesaving operations. the station new will become a community hub for Scotland. We pride ourselves in firstclass community involvement and everv vear we work with schools. watersports groups

Our current station in Anstruther is a reassuring presence for people in the water or by the shore. It's home to the only all-weather lifeboat on the Fife coast and our much-loved Mersey class lifeboat has helped our crew rescue around 550 people over the last 30 years. Technology has now moved on and we are expecting a new Shannon class lifeboat in 2023, which will vastly improve the speed and range of our operations, almost halving response times. Every second counts when it comes to saving lives.

The current station was built at the turn of the last century and is not

ST MONANS COMMUNITY LARDER

The weekly Community Larder opens every Friday at 11am at the Town Hall to welcome around 25 - 30 households who help us reduce food waste in and around St Monans. Every Thursday night we pick up sacks of food that the Co-op in Anstruther can no longer sell, and which would otherwise be going to landfill. But over the past three months we have been "recycling" the food, making it available to our customers, and at approximately six sacks per week,

we have already saved over 50 sacks worth of food in the first two months of the year.

Our success has led us to consider opening on another day per week! But it needs more volunteers who would be willing to give a couple of hours of their time fortnightly. - An increase in biodiversity both above and below ground: increased habitat for birds and insects as well as soil microorganisms
- Prevention of soil erosion and improved cycling of nutrients
- Better moisture retention and reduced wind speeds, benefitting the vegetable crops
- Apples!

Sustainable, Local Flowers

Not many folks give much thought to where their red roses for Valentine's Day came from. If you have a look in the garden, you will see the rose bushes looking like a bunch of twigs, so how do we get a beautiful bunch of roses in the depths of winter? The answer is that around 85% of the cut flowers available to buy in the UK are imported. They are grown on an industrial scale which involves the use of chemicals to control pests and diseases and to preserve them while they are flown around the world. This is a global industry with a massive carbon footprint.

At Keeping the Plot we offer an alternative approach. Our flowers are grown without the use of chemicals, respecting the environment and with great care for our most precious resource. the soil. We grow with the seasons, without artificial heat and offer fresh flowers from April to October. with 5% of the carbon footprint of imported flowers. They also have a style, beauty and often scent that can be missing in large scale production systems.

You can buy our flowers as bunches. wrapped in brown compostable paper, from Ardross Farm Shop. Pillars of Hercules and through Bowhouse Link.

We also offer Flower Arranger's Buckets which make a lovely gift for the recipient to arrange at home, avoiding single use plastic and wrapping materials that end up in



the bin. We have a subscription offer, with local delivery to St Andrews and the East Neuk or collected on Fridays from Bowhouse.

For those who need a larger volume of flowers, e.g. for a wedding or

event, then we can also supply DIY buckets of flowers and foliage.

As reported previously in Tidings, a Memorial Garden is planned for the corner of Station Road and East Street to commemorate the Fishing Disaster of 1875 when 3 vessels and 21 fishermen from St Monans were lost at sea in the great storm whilst returning home from fishing off the East Anglian coast. The garden will provide an appropriate space for people to sit and reflect on the perils of the sea that fishermen

OOR SPACE COMES TO ST MONANS!

We also cater for families and friends affected by these issues. Since 2019 we have been running a drop-in cafe at Anstruther Town Hall on Thursday nights as well as other activities.

As lockdown eased, it became clear there was also a demand in St Monans, with poor and expensive public transport making it difficult for people to get to Anstruther. In July 2021 we held our first dropin cafe at St Monans Town Hall on Monday night from 4pm to 5.30pm.

addiction support agencies in Fife and can put people in touch with professionals at FASS/ADAPT Substance Recovery, DAPL, the Near Fatal Overdose Team and Scottish Families Affected by Drugs and Alcohol. Representatives from these organisations sometimes drop in to the cafe and hold workshops, including a naloxone training session. Naloxone is a life-saving antidote which can be administered if someone overdoses and can be supplied to drug users and their families/ friends free of charge.
